An Invitation from the Bishops of England and Wales to Reflect on the Gift of Marriage and Family Life

The wedding feast of Cana



Scripture: John 2:1-12

On the third day there was a wedding in Cana of Galilee, and the mother of Jesus was there. Jesus and his disciples had also been invited to the wedding. When the wine gave out, the mother of Jesus said to him, “They have no wine.” And Jesus said to her, “Woman, what concern is that to you and to me? My hour has not yet come.” His mother said to the servants, “Do whatever he tells you.” Now standing there were six stone water-jars for the Jewish rites of purification, each holding twenty or thirty gallons. Jesus said to them, “Fill the jars with water.” And they filled them up to the brim. He said to them, “Now draw some out, and take it to the chief steward.” So they took it. When the steward tasted the water that had become wine, and did not know where it came from (though the servants who had drawn the water knew), the steward called the bridegroom and said to him, “Everyone serves the good wine first, and then the inferior wine after the guests have become drunk. But you have kept the good wine until now.” Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee, and revealed his glory; and his disciples believed in him.

After this he went down to Capernaum with his mother, his brothers, and his disciples; and they remained there for a few days.

Questions to ponder

- What is it like to have a wedding in the family?
What are the considerations and hopes?
- How does the story of the Wedding Feast at Cana touch our own experience of engagement, weddings, and post-wedding life? What is Mary’s role? And Jesus’? What is the water that Jesus turns into wine for us?
- How do we prepare for marriage?
How can the Church support us in this?
- How do we continue to journey in marriage? What helps? What hinders? How can our families help us? How might the Church support us?
